MESSAGE FROM OUR PRESIDENT LORELIE Q. OSIAL

As we went deeper into the pandemic in 2021, Pilipinas Shell remained steadfast and determined in its commitment to move the Filipino Forward. Challenges, sustained and new, with the gradual easing of COVID-19 restrictions, continued to test our capacity to bring people where they needed to go, deliver essential goods, and power progress with our communities.

We have firmly stayed on course because we know that what we do makes a positive difference to our consumers, stakeholders, communities where we operate, and our economy - thus, our country.

This ethos is echoed in the endeavors that we do through our social development arm, Pilipinas Shell Foundation, Inc. (PSFI). The Foundation has not only continued to carry out Pilipinas Shell's social investment programs in support of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (UN SDGs), it has taken a step further by crafting Inputs to Impact Journey, its five-year strategy to better operate in the new normal.

SUSTAINING IN CHALLENGING TIMES

This mindset to thrive and not just survive a crisis marks PSFI's journey of almost 40 years of sustaining initiatives in enabling the disadvantaged to become productive, responsible and empowered members of Philippine society and in helping strengthen Philippine community systems.

Despite the numerous restrictions, we strengthened our connections with the communities that we serve. Not only did we continue to deliver on our regular social investment programs, but we also launched initiatives to help alleviate the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. To date, we have spent over PHP150 million for our COVID-19 response activities, which has benefited close to 800,000 Filipinos. PSFI, in partnership with different organizations, provided around 523,000 meals to frontline workers. Additionally, our different classes of business (COBs) also initiated COVID-19 response programs not only for their indigent beneficiaries, but also for their business partners, extended workforce, and customers.

STRENGTHENING CONNECTIONS WITH COMMUNITIES

In 2021, we helped build brighter communities. We lit up a four-kilometer stretch within the Batangas-Lobo National Highway with solar powered street lights, which we expect will help reduce the probability of road accidents. We also delivered over 350 solar lamps to families across 10 provinces that

were affected when Super Typhoon Odette (Rai) battered the Visayas, Mindanao, and parts of Luzon in December last year.

We continued providing learning opportunities for our scholars. We've on-boarded 5 new Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) college students under the Shell-PhilDev program, and 60 new high school and college students under the Shell Tabangao Ladies Circle (STLC) and the Shell Employees Dependent Scholarship Program (SEDSP). We've also trained over 300 students and 55 teachers on STEM problem-solving skills through Shell NXplorers.


We are proud that Shell LiveWIRE, a global program we launched in the country in 2020, continues to help local technology and community enterprises remain strong and competitive during these difficult times through mentorship and coaching. Last year, we supported over 200 individuals on entrepreneurship skills training, and helped establish and sustain 40 businesses and enterprises.

The success of Ani Para sa Bayani dictates that we continue helping our farmers and fisher folk increase their livelihood income, while providing nutritious food to frontliners and vulnerable communities. We helped 250 farmers earn P2.4 million from the sale of their produce last year.

Much more is detailed in the report regarding our impact on our communities, given PSFI's broad scope of social development programs that promote nutrition and food security; health, sanitation, and safety; education and skills development; access to energy; livelihood and enterprise development; and environmental stewardship.

Behind the numbers, of individuals, families and communities that continue to benefit from our programs, are the human stories and lived experiences. For this, we thank all PSFI staff, partners, and stakeholders who stay dedicated to our goals.

We have touched the lives of millions, and with PSFI, we can continue to make an impact that matters on many more as together, we continue to keep moving the Filipino Forward.

The Covid-19 pandemic has brought about clear challenges, but it has also reminded us of the multitude of national concerns we have been facing for many years. Some would be our long-standing battle with Malaria and the HIV pandemic. We are proud to say that PSFI, through the grant of the Global Fund (GF), has taken a huge part in the significant reduction of cases in the country in the past 2 decades. This success has prompted GF to appoint us as the

Principal Recipient of a US\$22.3M grant for the HIV PROTECTS program that will aim to help end AIDS by 2030. This program has officially begun this year and will be implemented until 2023. The trust and commitment of our stakeholders has truly helped us push our agenda further. PSFI’s nutrition program, Roots to Shoots (RTS), has made evident strides in combating malnutrition in Camarines Sur in just its second year of operation. Through the collaboration between dependable partners like Manila Water Foundation (MWF) and World Vision Development Foundation, we are making a dent in contributing to the Philippine Plan of Action for Nutrition (PPAN) and are now at the cusp of expanding the program to other areas in need.

As we approach our 40th year in service, it is with pride that we say that each year has always been eventful and impactful because of the dedication of our partners and beneficiaries, and the blessed hands of the entire PSFI workforce.

We foresee many more changes in our future, but one thing for certain is that PSFI will continue its work to make these changes positive and meaningful.

ABOUT PILIPINAS SHELL FOUNDATION, INC. (PSFI)



PSFI was established on August 19, 1982, as the social investment arm of the Shell companies in the Philippines. This solidified Shell's commitment to empower communities, starting with the Sanayan sa Kakayahang Industriyal program (SKIL). During its initial years, PSFI saw the widespread unemployment problem in the country, which was responded to by providing technical-vocational training and employment linkaging to the Foundation's partner institutions. SKIL was only the beginning of the many programs PSFI was about to develop to help address the needs of Filipinos.

PSFI has touched more than 15 million lives in nearly 40 years through its diverse programs. We have expanded our reach to the rest of the country, currently focusing on communities in Batangas, Rizal, Camarines Sur, Palawan, Tagbilaran, Tacloban, and Cagayan de Oro. While we have major sites, we continue to extend our programs to other areas or regions in need.

In 1999, the Kilusan Ligtas Malaria started in Palawan in support of the Malampaya Joint Venture Gas to Power Project. This initiative was soon noticed by the Department of Health (DOH) and the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis, and Malaria (GFATM), and in 2006 PSFI was awarded as Principal Recipient of the GFATM Grant for Malaria. This Grant supported the establishment of the Movement Against Malaria program, which has been a resounding success in expanding the Palawan experience to forty (40) malaria-endemic provinces in the Philippines and facilitating the significant decrease in malaria cases nationwide. In 2021 the DOH and the GFATM awarded the Principal Recipient status for the HIV Program.

PSFI understands that more work needs to be done. Through our programs, we aim to continue contributing to the country's sustainable development through capacity building, promoting self-reliance, and developing the potential of communities and individuals alike. PSFI upholds the Shell core values of honesty, integrity, and respect for other people and the environment in all its work.

OUR FRAMEWORK



Our thematic areas and programs are rooted in six UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development: Zero Hunger (Goal 2), Good Health and Well-being (Goal 3), Quality Education (Goal 4), Affordable and Clean Energy (Goal 7), Decent Work and Economic Growth (Goal 8), and Climate Action (Goal 13).

PSFI's framework is also aligned with the Philippine Development Plan 2017-2022 and its three major pillars of "Malasakit," "Pagbabago," and "Patuloy na Pag-unlad". This is part of the country's 25-year development plan or AmBisyon Natin 2040, representing the Filipino people's collective long-term vision and aspirations for themselves and the country.

By focusing on these development frameworks, we aim to uplift communities and individuals through capacity-building programs that will enable them to become more productive, self-reliant, and active contributors to national development.



PSFI aims to provide access to early case detection and treatment even to the most far-flung communities through active monitoring and house-to-house visits.



Various programs have been implemented to support farmers across the country, from the Shell Training Farm Program to Ani Para sa Bayani.

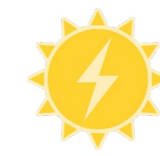

Responding to Immediate Needs

Anchored to the UN SDGs, the thematic areas of our programs mainly include Nutrition and Food Security, Health and Safety, Education, Energy, Livelihood, and Environment. We also respond to other immediate needs of communities through supplemental efforts such as disaster response, Covid-19 response and other community relations activities.

PSFI ensures a positive and sustainable impact under these thematic areas by assessing the communities' needs, strategically developing programs, identifying key partners, acquiring resources, and monitoring and evaluating the programs after executing them.



PSFI'S 2021-2025 STRATEGY: INPUT TO IMPACT



We are called to adapt to rapidly changing times. The ongoing pandemic has proven to be one of the most challenging crises the country has faced. It emphasized the need for better systems and strategies across all sectors and industries. For PSFI, this has been an opportunity for us to review and improve our delivery across our six thematic areas and target SDGs.

Since PSFI's inception, the goal has always been for our host communities to become self-reliant. Our 2021-2025 Strategy is a more focused approach on contributing to the six thematic areas by operating in key locations where we can make the greatest impact. Our programs consist of those that: 1) meet current basic needs, 2) invest for future needs, and 3) secure needs now into the future. These are backed by supporting functions, so our programs realize their full potential.

MOVING FORWARD, ADAPTING TO CHANGE

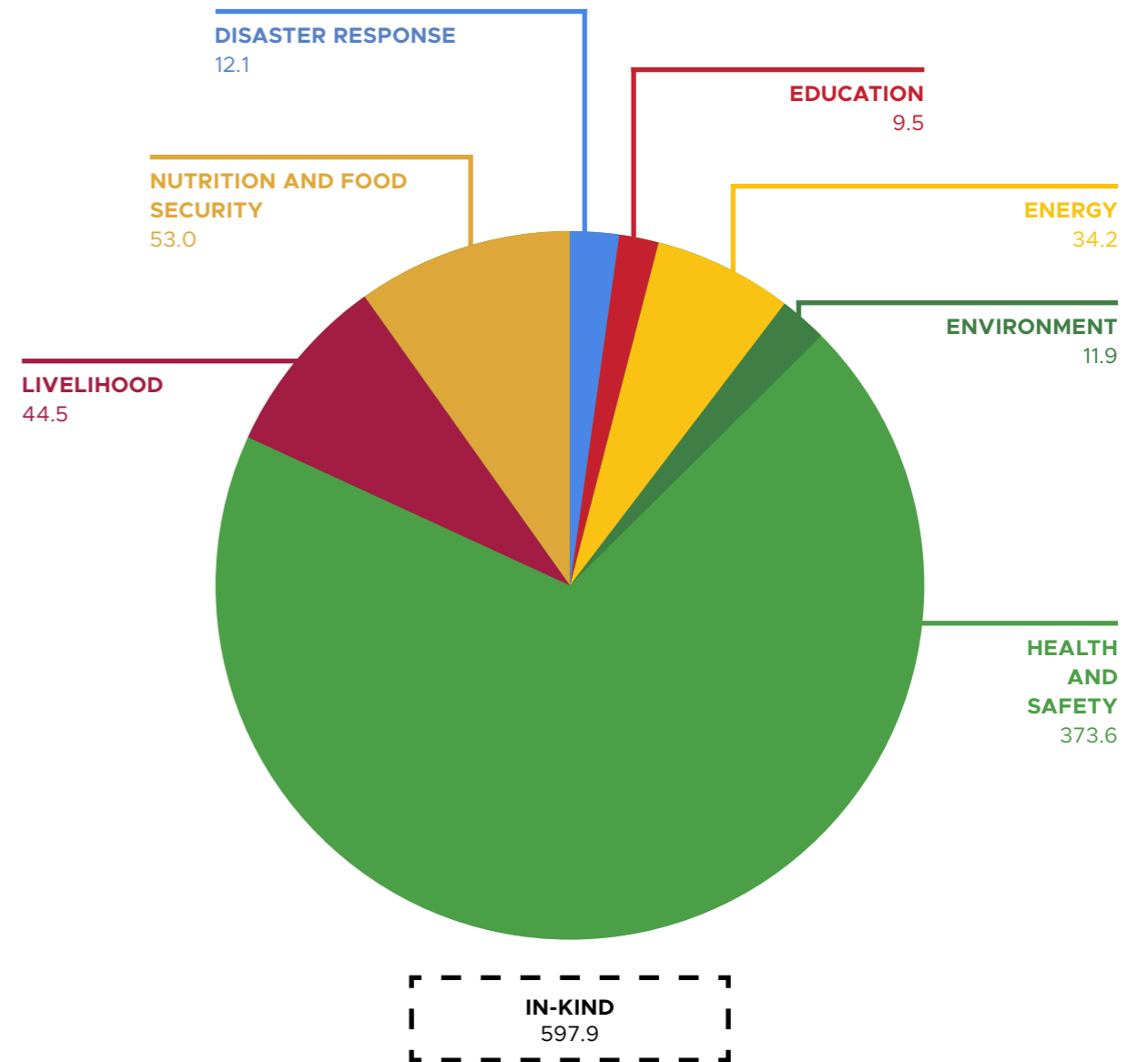


Pilipinas Shell exists to serve its communities. From assisting with education and providing livelihood opportunities to conducting health and safety education and health care programs, empowering Filipinos is at the heart of what we do. Especially for this year, our successes were made possible with the help of our partner organizations, our improved internal systems, and our host communities, who have stayed resilient.

OUR PROGRAM SPENDING

In 2021, PSFI spent Php 539 million in cash grants and received Php 598 million worth of in-kind donations. This amounts to a total of Php 1,137 million spent on all our sustainability programs, which is around 31% more than in 2020.

COMMITTING TO OUR COMMUNITIES



The LiveWIRE EcoBrick Project, one of PSFI's many programs in the City, aims to address Cagayan de Oro's waste management concerns while providing livelihood.

In 2021, we continued and expanded our programs for our host communities despite the challenges posed by the pandemic, such as in Tacloban, Tagbilaran, and Pasacao. For instance, we executed various programs and activities under the Anibong and Yolanda Recovery and Rehabilitation Program (ARRP) in Tacloban City such as LiveWIRE, SKIL, Gulayamanan, BiyaHero, Ani Para sa Bayani, deploying additional teacher fellows, establishing a beach forest, and constructing more housing units and an EcoBrick Hub. ARRP was implemented to respond to the devastation caused by Typhoon Yolanda in the City. Eight years later, PSFI has created a strong relationship with the communities and continues to work with them.

We implemented and resurfaced programs for communities in Tagbilaran and Pasacao. PSFI implemented the Tagbilaran Sustainable Development Program, which encompassed mangrove planting, waste management programs, and BiyaHero. In Pasacao, we focused on conducting Nutrition and Food Security programs such as the Shell Training Farms and Roots to Shoots (RTS) projects.

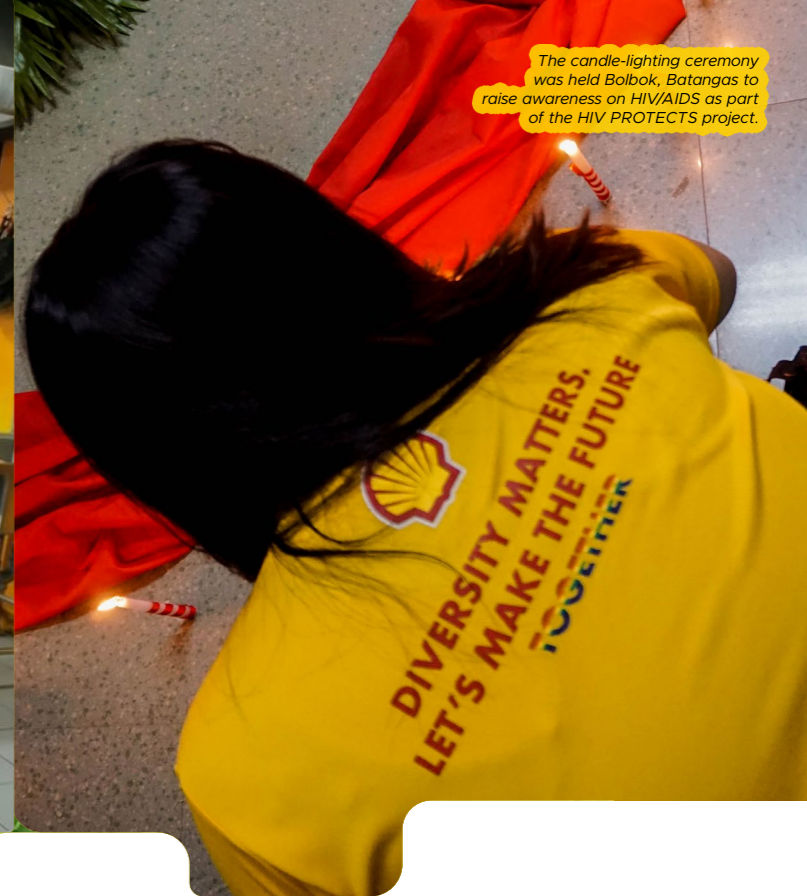
Since its inception, the Foundation has championed proper education and helped individuals even in finding livelihood opportunities. In 2021, Shell hired eight additional Shell-PhilDev scholar alumni – who we supported throughout their undergraduate studies.

FORGING RELATIONSHIPS AND STRENGTHENING PARTNERSHIPS

While collaborating has always been key to PSFI's overall strategy, the past two years underscored the importance of forming and leveraging partnerships to overcome adversity and deliver quality programs. This is particularly important in providing disaster relief, where we need to respond urgently. During the disaster response to Typhoon Odette, we worked with Benita and Catalino Yap Foundation (BCYF) and the Cordillera Career Development College (CCDC) to identify the needs of communities – allowing us to assist 91,270 individuals.

PSFI has made it a priority to provide our farmers with the support they need and deserve. We

have launched programs such as Roots to Shoots and continued the operations of Shell Training Farms, including the Palawan Eco-Agro Park, to aid them throughout, from training farmers to marketing their produce. We partnered with the Ayala Foundation, an established farmers federation, and the El Nido LGU for the El Nido Food Terminal Project, which serves as a venue for farmers to sell local products and reach communities in El Nido and surrounding areas. To improve our farmers' access to information, PSFI worked with Chektec to introduce the OkCheck mobile application. This allowed them to undergo PSFI's training on the application, helping them acquire sustainable farming methods and solutions to farm cultural management and operations challenges. Overall, our programs aim to capacitate our farmers to improve their quality of life.

We aim to empower women through our programs, especially in providing decent livelihood opportunities. Through the Shell LiveWIRE program, PSFI and Connected Women partnered to spearhead the Elevate AIDA Training Program. This TESDA-accredited program focuses on training

women in artificial intelligence and data annotation (AIDA). This allowed us to reach communities and support women from Tacloban, Calapan, Pasacao, and Tagbilaran.

Before the pandemic, we have already been facing national health concerns. The HIV epidemic is among those, as the country experienced a 174%-rise in incidence between 2010 and 2017¹. The Philippines has the fastest-growing HIV epidemic in the western Pacific, made worse by the COVID-19 pandemic as the surge of infections shot up by 54% from 2020 to 2021 alone². With the support of The Global Fund, PSFI launched the Philippines Response in Optimizing Testing, Empowered Communities,

Treatment, and Sustainability (PROTECTS) Program to support persons living with HIV (PLHIV) and their families through various projects. In its first year, the HIV PROTECTS Grant has been implemented in 301 sites across 11 regions in the country.

ADAPTING OUR SYSTEM

Improving our operations means that we can serve Filipino communities better. Our Input to Impact Strategy has been a major milestone, which will guide our efforts in the next five years to make the most impact. We improved our virtual communication to better reach partners and operation sites and launched the PSFI website to enhance transparency and spotlight the inspiring stories of our communities. These improvements contribute to a holistic system – which ripples into empowering Filipinos and creating lasting change.

RESPONDING TO IMMEDIATE NEEDS

The Philippines is among the most disaster-prone countries in the world. According to PAGASA, more tropical cyclones (TC) enter the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR) than anywhere else globally. An average of 20 TCs enter the region each year, with around eight to nine crossing the country³. Coupled with the pandemic, the effects of these natural disasters have been amplified – with everyday Filipinos bearing the brunt of the impacts. As these issues recur and persist, PSFI continuously shows up for its communities. Our programs seek to bring much-needed relief to benefit those affected in the short- and long-term.

PSFI applied learnings from previous programs and structured the disaster response process from three pillars: 1) working within our fenceline communities, 2) assessing the needs and situation, 3) aligning with and securing funding support from the Shell companies, and 4) tapping into our partner organizations.

The first pillar involves PSFI working within existing operation sites, mainly allocating resources in these areas. We also consider areas with Shell service stations. Second, PSFI assesses the needs of communities through engagements. We then align with the Shell companies to secure funding support. Lastly, PSFI coordinates with partners already present in areas to efficiently provide relief.

Through our disaster response process, we have been able to pool resources and help thousands of Filipinos weather the storm. For instance, Pilipinas Shell provided relief goods such as food, drinking water, and hygiene kits to nearly 7,000 families affected by Super Typhoon Odette⁴. Through the collective efforts of PSFI, the Shell Companies in the Philippines, and partner organizations such as DZRH, BCYF, the University of Cebu, Philippine Disaster Resilience Foundation (PDRF), and Philippine Business for Social Progress (PBSP), we were able to reach communities in Cagayan de Oro, Cebu, Bohol, Tacloban, Southern Leyte (Liloan), Palawan, Cabadbaran, Surigao, Siargao, and Dinagat Island.

We also facilitated relief operations for the residents of Shell-GK Libjo after Typhoon Rolly, the 7th most destructive storm to hit the Philippines (as of November 2020), devastated the area. We provided nutritious family food packs and hygiene kits to 79 households as advocates for health, safety, nutrition, and food security.

To face the unprecedented challenges of the pandemic, PSFI employed a crisis response and management framework that focused on connecting communities – creating a system wherein all parties benefit. To develop agricultural communities, PSFI sourced goods from Rizal,

Palawan, and Camarines Sur farmers to provide fruits and vegetables locally purchased from farmers and cooperatives for Filipino frontliners through “Para sa Bayani,” a project that bridges medical frontliners and the agricultural sector. Around 38.66 tons of vegetables and 12.47 tons of rice were distributed, generating Php 2.42 million for the farmers.

PSFI is ready to assist communities in times of need. In Tagbilaran, one of our focus areas, PSFI swiftly conducted a relief operation that assisted 700 household barangays situated along with the coastal areas.

ADAPTING TO ADVERSITY: ODETTE AND MARING RESPONSE

Throughout the years, PSFI has adapted to the unique challenges of different crises. In 2021, we focused on maintaining our support for vulnerable

communities throughout COVID-19, providing disaster relief to those affected by Typhoon Odette and Tropical Storm Maring, and working with communities to boost their resilience to disasters.

PSFI saw food security as an especially prevalent issue in times of crisis. Our disaster relief focused on delivering basic necessities such as food and water to those affected by Odette and Maring. We continued our Ani Para sa Bayani program to link farmers with communities and individuals who need access to healthy and nutritious food.

While providing immediate relief is essential, PSFI advocates for resilience and self-resilience. For instance, we offered vegetable seedlings to those affected by Maring to help jump-start farmers' livelihoods.

In Cagayan de Oro City, one of our host communities, we implemented the Andam (Ready) Kagayan Disaster Risk Reduction, Prevention and Mitigation (DRRPM) Program to capacitate communities to prevent or mitigate accidents and disasters. Given the restrictions to reduce the spread of COVID-19, we introduced virtual platforms training for the officers and personnel of the host communities. We also scouted for venues to accommodate requirements and ensure that health protocols are observed. The participants appreciated the training, particularly with the virtual platforms that allowed them to participate in the program virtually. Through Andam Kagayan, Brgy. Puntod established an early warning system and was provided with PPEs for responding to incidents and disasters.

LEARNINGS

PSFI takes every opportunity to learn from past experiences and enhances its disaster response strategy. In responding to Odette and Maring, we improved our system to prioritize funds and goods, identify local partners, and link with other organizations to maximize our efforts. We aim to continue with our evaluation systems, especially for disaster relief, to give our communities the urgent, effective, and long-term help they need.

ANI PARA SA BAYANI

The Ani Para sa Bayani program has proven to be successful since its initial launch in 2020, having operated in Metro Manila, Palawan, Cagayan de Oro, Camarines Sur, Batangas, Quezon, Tacloban, Cavite, and Laguna. Its goal has been to provide healthy and nutritious food to frontliners and vulnerable communities while supporting the livelihood of farmers and fisherfolk amid the COVID-19 pandemic. The program highlighted the spirit of bayanihan as grassroots communities and healthcare professionals worked together in promoting sustainable systems that help address food security in the country, strongly supported by the private sector.

We assisted more than 250 farmers in distributing produce to 9 sites, generating an additional income of Php 253,680 just through marketing support. We have made great strides in helping address food insecurity by linking communities. For instance, our farmers from Mirayon, Bukidnon have provided around eight tonnes of assorted vegetables to more than 3,000 beneficiaries in Cagayan de Oro City. We delivered these produce to communities and individuals, namely the JR Borja General Hospital, Brgys. Puntod and Macabalan, North Mindanao Medical Center (NMMC), and the South City Central School that serves as one of the City's Temporary Treatment and Monitoring Facilities.

ODETTE AND MARING DISASTER RESPONSE



As Tropical Storm Maring and Super Typhoon Odette devastated the country, PSFI ceaselessly provides support to those in need such as in Cagayan de Oro, Brgy. Puntod.

An average of 20 cyclones hit the country annually⁵. In 2021, Severe Tropical Storm Maring and Super Typhoon Odette were among those that devastated the country – wreaking havoc across North Luzon and the VisMin region, respectively. Disasters like these have altered lives countless times, and PSFI has always been quick to help communities regain footing.

Aside from initial relief efforts for those affected by Maring, we aimed to support communities by providing aid that carries over long-term. LGUs and host communities in Benguet and La Union initiated relief efforts and requested assistance from the Foundation. After our partners assessed these areas, PSFI assisted 395 severely affected families and distributed 35 sacks of rice and 800 packs of assorted vegetable seedlings across Benguet.

Odette was the fifteenth and strongest storm to hit the Philippines in 2021, which affected nearly 4.5 million people and devastated the provinces of Bohol, Cebu, Surigao del Norte, Siargao, and the Dinagat Islands⁶. PSFI prioritized providing basic necessities such as food and water to affected communities.

Aside from the inherent difficulties of disaster relief, this was especially challenging due to the lack of on-the-ground personnel, minimal means of communication, and lack of electricity and fuel in affected areas. Despite these challenges, PSFI pushed through and reached communities in Cagayan de Oro City, Tacloban City, Puerto Princesa City, Tagbilaran City, Cagayan de Oro City, and Cebu City – assisting 27,710 individuals and more than 6,930 families.

SUSTAINING PROGRESS

Response to Communities Under Emergencies (RESCUE) Palawan goes beyond providing immediate relief to beneficiaries by providing tools and trainings that would strengthen their farming skills.

OVERVIEW

PSFI helps enable Filipinos to become self-sufficient by working closely with various sectors in helping them realize their goals and capacities. We provide the necessary training to help increase employment opportunities and sustainable livelihoods. We established this thematic area in line with SDG 8: Decent Work and Economic Growth.

Two years later, the COVID-19 pandemic still affects everyday Filipinos the most. Despite the supposed economic recovery, uncertainties still stem from this crisis – leaving many in dire need of decent livelihood opportunities. While the country experienced the lowest unemployment rate at 6.5% in November 2021, the Philippine Statistics Authority reported that this inched up to 6.6% three months later⁷.

Regardless of fluctuations in the national economy, there are still more than three million jobless Filipinos. If not unemployment, the pandemic pushed people towards low-quality or unstable jobs⁸.

As the local economy remains volatile, PSFI stands firm in equipping the Filipinos' resilience with skills that would allow them to achieve their full potential. Different issues require different approaches, which is why we assess communities to cater to the unique needs of our beneficiaries.

We conduct programs executed in the short and long term so that we can address both urgent and systemic livelihood issues. In recent years, our Response to Communities Under Emergencies (RESCUE) project focused on aiding communities during natural disasters and other events like fires and accidents. Over the course of the pandemic, RESCUE set out to help frontline workers, health services, enterprises, students, and others who have been severely affected. PSFI helped protect beneficiaries from the economic shocks resulting from lockdown by providing resources like farming equipment and materials, as well as training and learning materials for food production, livelihood, and COVID-19.

Pilipinas Shell was founded to provide training that would enable Filipinos to find decent livelihood opportunities. Shell LiveWIRE (SLW) was established as a flagship program to address this, branching off into other projects to address diverse needs. The SLW Community Enterprise

Development program focused on capacitating enterprise-minded members of the community to promote self-reliance and develop their overall potential. For instance, we tapped into the solo parents' group in Macabalan, Cagayan de Oro to assist them in their livelihood by providing courses such as Food Processing.

The SLW program in partnership with Connected Women had a similar rationale, targeted to specifically empower women. We conducted the Elevate AIDA Training Program with Connected Women, training participants from grassroots communities to learn data labeling and annotation skills. This year, we implemented the Shell LiveWIRE Acceleration Program again to support and reach more local enterprises and tech start-ups nationwide.

Our programs aim to spark change that cascades into opportunities that create long-term impacts. Sanayan sa Kakayahang Industriyal (SKIL), Gas Mo Bukas Ko (GMBK), and Unlad sa Pasada (USP) are interconnected programs that capacitate beneficiaries through scholarships for technical-vocational training and other free educational programs. The SKIL Program has extended opportunities to out-of-school youths, with 34 scholars from Cagayan de Oro completing their training in December 2021 and endorsed 28 scholars in Talim for a TESDA scholarship. We further supported training by donating various tools and equipment such as multi-functioned welding machines, grinders, and old PSFI vehicles.



SKIL scholars in Talim take courses welding, electrical installation and maintenance, housekeeping, food and beverages servicing and other related trades.

GMBK and USP are modified SKIL programs that were created in collaboration with the Pilipinas Shell Petroleum Corporation (PSPC) Retail Group. GMBK is aimed at our retail stations' staff, also sponsoring their technical-vocational training to enhance their skills for better economic opportunities. Our scholars come from different cities in the country, namely Dasmariñas, Manila, Cebu, Cagayan de Oro, Batangas, and Santa Rosa. The USP program is an extension of GMBK, which aims to give back to jeepney drivers and other public utility drivers (PUV) who are loyal members of the "Pepeng Pasada Club" or the Shell Go + a PSPC-Retail group's loyalty program. PSFI so far has 35 USP scholars from different cities enrolled at the St. Mutien College - Entrep.Nation, which provides online training on basic entrepreneurship for our beneficiaries.



RESCUE has given beneficiaries like Chita Castrowith livelihood opportunities in farming.

We understand that some communities need more focused assistance. Anibong and Yolanda Recovery and Rehabilitation Program (ARRP) and Tagbilaran Sustainable Development Program (TSDP) are long-term, integrated, and strategic programs for Anibong, Tacloban City, and Tagbilaran City respectively. ARRP is a social development program that concentrates on disaster relief and resiliency for those affected by Typhoon Yolanda. The projects launched within this program are SLW, SKIL, beach forest rehabilitation, the construction of housing units, and the Gulayamanan project. Under Gulayamanan, we set up a community garden at the relocation site to improve the community's access to fresh produce.

TSDP was initially launched in 2006-2012 to expand livelihood, environment, and health and safety initiatives in Tagbilaran. We reintroduced

TSDP in 2021 with a sustainable long-term approach – aligning with the City's vision of enhancing socio-economic development and community resilience. While previous programs were successful, PSFI is dedicated to the sustainable development of this community. As with Tagbilaran, we are devoted to our beneficiaries' lasting growth.

LEARNINGS

As with most of our programs, our long-term projects require us to constantly keep track and monitor our progress. This is especially important when working with many partners who are experts in their field, dedicated beneficiaries, and other stakeholders. That said, we are able to expand our programs' reach, scale, and efficiency when we form these partnerships. This motivates us to pursue our efforts as we aim to upscale and improve our programs.

Considering the pandemic, PSFI was pushed to strictly follow health and safety protocols, and adapt to virtual platforms to effectively communicate and coordinate with our stakeholders – ensuring that our projects have a meaningful impact and that they remain successful.

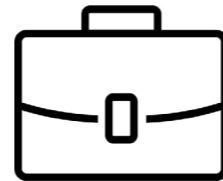

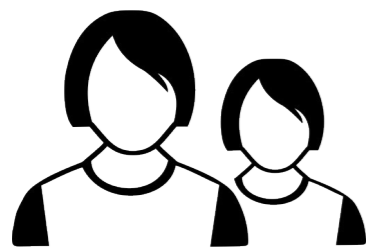

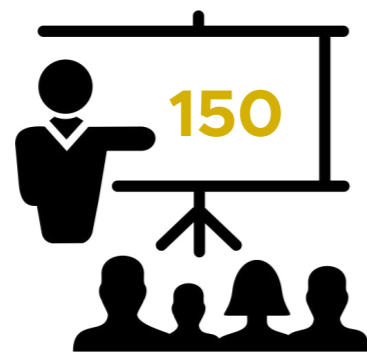

LIVELIHOOD PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS



BUILDING RESILIENCE THROUGH SUSTAINABLE LIVELIHOODS: ANIBONG AND YOLANDA RECOVERY AND REHABILITATION PROGRAM (ARRP)

PSFI implements holistic programs that contribute to their community resilience. ARRP is a social development program launched for communities surrounding the facility of Shell Anibong Terminal, following the immense devastation of Typhoon Yolanda that damaged most homes and altered lives.

In support of Tacloban City's last phase of Yolanda Recovery Interventions, we set out to construct additional houses, establish a beach forest as part of the DRR efforts by the local government, and address some common problems of those residing in North Kawayan Ville. Among the major issues of the residents is the lack of livelihood opportunities at the relocation site.

We believe that communities are fully capable of developing. Our role lies in providing them

with the tools and resources to achieve their greatest potential. As part of SKIL, we sponsored technical-vocational skills training for 50 individuals and linked beneficiaries with job opportunities within the local industry. We also supported 75 residents through entrepreneurial training.

Through ARRP, the local Seamstress Group expanded their market and is now an accredited cooperative of the City. PSFI aided in upskilling and providing them with basic financial training, and we are transitioning so that the Seamstress Group will be ready to receive PSFI's grant support. We aim to continue empowering communities like North Kawayan Ville and help communities thrive and rise above challenges such as natural disasters.

SUPPORTING BREAKTHROUGHS: THE SHELL LIVEWIRE ACCELERATION PROGRAM

Since our first flagship project, PSFI has strived to drive progress by upskilling Filipinos. Through the SLW Acceleration Program, we promote enterprise development by working with communities to grow their innovative local businesses. The SLW Acceleration Program supports businesses that are on the cutting edge of innovation, those which focus on Energy Solutions, Environment and Circular Economy, and Local Prosperity.

Now in its second year of partnership with IGNITE PH, the program has further increased its visibility by leveraging this connection. Through branding and partnership, we received over 400 applications from both tech startups and

community enterprises. The culminating event presented during the Ignite Cyber Event also received around 1200 views from registered audiences.

Various innovators and key players in the tech startup ecosystem in NCR were also part of the program, strengthening the training provided.

We selected ten teams from areas of Energy, Environment & Circular Economy, and Local Prosperity to participate in the program. SLW Acceleration supported a diverse group of cohorts by providing them with training, mentorship, funding, and an opportunity to be integrated into Shell's value chain.

We ensure that our programs are practical and fitting for our beneficiaries. The SLW Acceleration Program follows the global LiveWIRE modules crafted by DAI. Through our initial assessment, we localize the curriculum to adapt to the participating cohorts' unique needs. Our mentors guided the community and social enterprises founders on improving their business operations, re-learning financials, marketing, and digital transformation. As for tech startups, we developed a diverse lesson plan to help them rapidly grow their business through understanding business pivots, PR and corporate communications, optimizing sales, creating a board of directors, fundraising and investment, and other learnings.

Among the Top Three Tech Start-ups, PSFI awarded a Php 500,000 grant to Agro Digital PH as the Grand Winner. Each of the six community enterprises received funding support of Php 100,000 at the end of the acceleration program. During the three-month acceleration, we also provided funding assistance to the rest of the tech start-ups to assist them in upscaling their business development, manpower resources, and branding activities. Pilipinas Shell thrives in witnessing beneficiaries flourish – we aim to continue driving progress by supporting local innovative entrepreneurs.

CLOSING THE GAP, AIMING HIGHER: SLW - CONNECTED WOMEN PARTNERSHIP

While the Philippines remains to be the top country in Asia with the narrowest gender gap, it is clear that more work needs to be done to improve women's economic participation and opportunity⁹. To this end, Pilipinas Shell launches programs that empower women through livelihood and entrepreneurship. We partner with organizations like Connected Women to further our efforts in uplifting Filipino women.

Connected Women is a social impact tech startup that offers online skills development and work opportunities for women. They aim to provide high-quality talent for businesses across the globe while empowering Filipino women and their families.

Connected Women spearheaded the Elevate AIDA Training Program through PSFI's SLW. As a TESDA-accredited program and accelerated learning initiative, Elevate AIDA was an accessible way for women from grassroots communities to learn data labeling skills – allowing them to generate income remotely.

PSFI is currently supporting 20 women from Brgys. 69 and 70 in Anibong, Tacloban City through this program. Connected Women also finalized screening applicants to the final 20 for their pilot project. To reach more beneficiaries, we have jumpstarted the program's roll-out in Calapan, Pasacao, and Tagbilaran. We aim to extend better opportunities to more women in the country through similar partnerships and programs, enabling them to live empowered and fulfilling lives.



OUR IMPACT

Strengthening local economies starts with empowering everyday Filipinos. We see the depth of our impact in hearing their stories. With livelihood being so vital, we are proud to claim that the opportunities we extend have changed lives for the better. This is especially true for those who have been PSFI's long-term beneficiaries such as Maryjane Macatangay of the Bayanihan Para Sa Pangkabuhayan (BPSB) program and Naomi Celino of the RESCUE program.

Naomi has been our beneficiary for four years. She was a former OFW who chose to stay back in Palawan when applying abroad became too difficult. Eventually, she engaged in vegetable gardening instead of seeking a local job in the City because the salary was insufficient for her family's needs. She became one of our beneficiaries under the Turismo at Negosyo Dulot ng Ingat Kalikasan (TANDIKAN) in 2018, which was a project to help develop community-based sustainable tourism.

The pandemic hampered the local tourism industry and made it hard for her to sell produce due to travel restrictions. PSFI helped her pull through the pandemic by purchasing her harvests and teaching her how to sell online as part of the Ani Para sa Bayani project under RESCUE. She has since expanded her organic farming by investing in equipment and producing high-value crops while sharing her knowledge on production with her relatives and friends.

We extend help to beneficiaries whether for extraordinary circumstances or persisting day-to-day struggles. For Linafer Baseo, the hardships that come with raising children alone make life a daily challenge. Through PSFI's SLW Community Enterprise Development project, Linafer was one of the 25 solo parents in Macabalan who were part of our Skills Livelihood Training. For her, the Food Processing training was a silver lining – "I am confident that no matter what, I can see the future ahead me that I can provide the needs of myself and my children through this training they have provided us."

EDUCATION

LEARNING AMID ADVERSITY

Shell-PhilDev scholarship program persists amid the pandemic, adapting to virtual platforms.



The Philippines is experiencing an education sector crisis as one of the five countries in the world that have not resumed on-site learning since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic. The disparity between students' access to technology has proven to be a major roadblock in continuing education, as many do not have the resources they need to consistently participate in online learning.

On the other hand, the country's fight against COVID-19 continued throughout 2021, with several waves of infection dampening chances for children to safely return to schools. Education and the economy were both disrupted as activities throughout the country were brought to a halt. Unemployment meant parents would have further difficulty in funding the studies of their children.

The overall lack of stable access to education coupled with the absence of social interactions between fellow students and teachers comes with its own detriments, such as lower literacy rates, higher dropout rates, and negative effects on mental well-being, according to UNICEF. PSFI's programs aim to close this widening gap in

learning accessibility by making quality education more available to individuals around the country—even during the pandemic—through capacity building, financial assistance, and the provision of supplementing tools and equipment needed for learning.

Currently, the Shell Tabangao Ladies Circle (STLC), Shell-PhilDev scholarship program, and Shell Employees Dependent Scholarship Program (SEDS) are able to deliver the funding support that students need to pursue their education. PSFI's Brigada Eskwela, on the other hand, equips schools with the tools they need to create a productive learning environment.

STLC and the Shell-PhilDev scholarship programs provide deserving students in basic and higher education with both capacity-building opportunities and financial assistance. The programs engage scholars through events and interactive platforms where the personal development of students is encouraged through mentorship and guidance from the Shell and PSFI community. STLC was established originally as a non-profit

organization with its own scholarship program. Through a Memorandum of Agreement signed in March 2021, STLC scholars were turned over to PSFI to ensure continued support for its current 47 scholars.

SEDS also gives educational grants to children of Shell companies in the Philippines (SciP) employees as part of the company's commitment to the welfare of its people and their families. Dependents of regular employees who meet the program qualifications are awarded financial assistance in their school of choice. Here, PSFI serves as the main conduit in ensuring the delivery and oversight of the support provided by SciP.

Enactus Philippines is a program where PSFI served as an active constituent both in its programs and the Board of Trustees, supporting their global program which encouraged college-level students to develop innovative projects that aim to improve the livelihood capacities and opportunities of their communities. The country winners of this program were set to take part in the global pitch challenge in the US, but due to the pandemic constraints and quarantine issues, PSFI had to resort to conducting the pitches online.

Despite this, seven groups were able to develop astounding innovative solutions to their community problems.

In going beyond providing for the material needs of our scholars, PSFI also encourages creative and critical thinking through our global STEM program, NXplorers. It is a workshop-based program centered on the food-water-energy nexus that promotes the pursuit of further education in the sciences.

PSFI also launched other initiatives in response to the needs of schools and students during the pandemic. We provided five elementary and three high schools from TALIM with necessary supplies such as hand wash, hand sanitizer, and disinfectant concentrate by Simply Care of SIMCO to support the new normal mode of education. They also received sets of Portable Media Library by Knowledge Channel, containing videos, teaching aids, and other valuable media production that will supplement their learning. In line with this, we conducted technical training regarding the use of the Portable Media Library for the 54 teachers and the school principal.

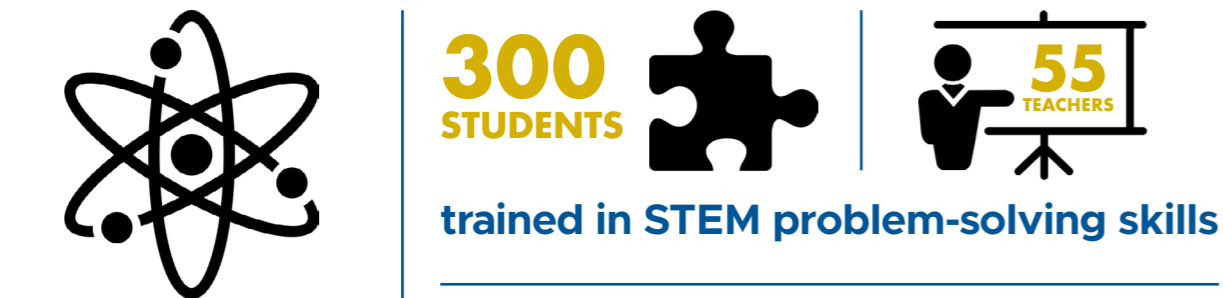
In Pasacao, PSFI also donated printers, copy paper, Wi-Fi modems, learner's kits, books provided by National Book Store, and hygiene kits to over 300 teachers and 6,000 students in 20 public schools.

LEARNINGS

The unprecedented challenges arising from the pandemic required innovative solutions. This year, PSFI's eagerness to adjust and turn to digital systems helped in providing our beneficiaries with quality education even in challenging times.

Constant communication also helps us maintain a good relationship with our program partners and keeps the project on track. Outside of planning and project management, communication can also take the form of better engagements with and among our beneficiaries. This includes sharing stories of success from one scholar to another, and inspiring others to pursue their dreams with vigor.

EDUCATION PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS



EQUIPPING SAFER SCHOOLS: BRIGADA ESKWELA

Schools around the country are slowly preparing for the return of on-site classes, making sure that campuses are safe and ready to accommodate students. Through Brigada Eskwela, PSFI remains committed to supporting schools, this time, by donating materials that would best equip schools for learning in the new normal.

In Cagayan de Oro, Macabalan Elementary School is getting ready for the school year with the planning and printing of learning modules. Brigada Eskwela donated a risograph machine to the elementary school for ease of printing and lowered production costs.

Meanwhile, in Tabangao, Ambulong, Libjo, San Isidro, and Malitam, five elementary schools received sets of hygiene products by Simply Care of the San Isidro Multi-Purpose Cooperative (SIMCO). Only a few individuals visit these schools regularly, but it is equally important that they closely follow health and safety protocol on campus.

To support blended learning, Brigada Eskwela donated a Portable Media Library (PML) by the Knowledge Channel Foundation, Inc. The PML functions as an online platform for communicating with students, where teachers can make creative lessons using videos.

SHELL NXPLORERS AWARDS

The Shell NXplorers Recognition Awards celebrate program participants and inspire students to become the problem solvers of today and the leaders of tomorrow.

In 2021, the awarding ceremony was held digitally, with the following winners across four awards categories in the Philippines:

PSFI also donated four more mini FM setups in select schools of El Nido to support the continued effort of the Department of Education to conduct radio-based instruction. This donation was funded by the Palawan Chamber of Commerce as a continuing activity of the Tulay Para sa Bagong Normal - Tulong Para sa Bayani which is a collaboration of various organizations in Palawan and Puerto Princesa started in late 2020 as a response to the COVID pandemic.

OUR IMPACT

We invest in the future by setting up the youth of today for success. For decades, PSFI has recognized the potential of students around the Philippines who need supplemental support in order to grow into leaders, innovators, and change-makers.

Together with PhilDev, PSFI sponsors tertiary education for students pursuing STEM courses. In 2021, 12 beneficiaries of the Shell-PhilDev Sponsorship Program graduated, two of which graduated with honors. Some of these graduates go on to work with the company, harnessing their expertise to give back to communities.

Past graduates who have been working with Shell include Mark Chester Rey, Alexis Margret Aberion, and Reinwill Jan Boyles. After graduating, the three joined Shell under the Terminal Operational Administration department and have since then been promoted to different roles within the company.

Shell-PhilDev's student-scholars have shown tenacity and the drive to learn, even during the

difficulties of the pandemic. In 2020, scholar Joshua Aldave graduated during the first year of the global pandemic, where schools were just starting to encounter and adjust to the nationwide lockdowns and restrictions. Having studied and prepared carefully for board exams during this period, Joshua was able to take and top the 2021 Chemical Engineering Board Exams, placing 8th.

We hope that through the success of our scholars, PSFI will inspire other students and assure them that with hope and effort, they may also achieve greater heights. An incoming College graduate of our SLTC scholarship is Mark Balita, who was taken into the program since he was in Grade 7. Mark has demonstrated academic excellence throughout his scholarship. In elementary, he was among Libjo's Top 10 Achievers and graduated with honors in junior and senior high school. He is also a consistent Dean's Lister in college and actively participated in various extracurricular activities, nourishing his passion for arts, writing, and journalism. He will graduate from college in 2022 with a Bachelor's Degree in Elementary Education.

BUILDING UP BETTER, HEALTHIER LIVES

Now more than ever, access to healthcare has become a growing concern across the country as individuals and families around the world faced the COVID-19 pandemic. Communicable diseases such as tuberculosis have long plagued the Philippines, which has been ranked as the 8th leading cause of death in the country as of 2018. With the novel coronavirus, better measures must be taken and institutions must be strengthened to better protect Filipinos.

Capacity-building, funding, and overall improvements to regional healthcare were cited by the Oxford Business Group as necessary for uplifting the current state of health and safety in the country. Doing so will not only help us better cope with COVID-19 but also prepare for and prevent future diseases and health crises.

As the COVID-19 pandemic has shown, capacity-building programs must be balanced with

immediate action. During the COVID-19 surge in the first quarter of last year, PSFI, in partnership with Shell Philippines Exploration B.V. (SPEX) and the Department of Energy, donated 3,500 antigen COVID test kits to Rizal Province. This improved the capacity of the site to detect cases, isolate individuals, and prevent further transmission.

We also supported the three-day National Vaccination Drive in Palawan, by providing meals to 750 medical staff of the vaccination team and volunteers. PSFI also provided 860 Shell items as part of the raffle draw for Palawenos after their vaccination to encourage the local communities to get vaccinated. This was conducted in seven sites simultaneously, in partnership with the City Government of Puerto Princesa, UPAA, AMOS TARA Community Center, UP PALAWEÑOS, JCI, Rotary Club of Puerto Princesa, and Palawan State University

PSFI has done its part through its focus on health and safety programs that touch lives globally. One of these is the Global Fund HIV Grant - Philippine Response to Optimize Testing, Empowered Communities, Treatment and Sustainability

(HIV PROTECTS), of which, PSFI is a Principal Recipient. With this grant, PSFI implements key activities and interventions under the 2020-2022 Philippine Health Sector HIV Strategic Plan. Currently, this is implemented in 301 sites across 11 regions in the country.

The Movement Against Malaria (MAM) program, which aims to establish community-based solutions against Malaria, has been funded by the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria (GFATM), Malampaya Joint Venture Partners, and Shell Foundation International.

We also conducted community medical missions and distributed equipment to barangays in need, particularly in Tabangao, Ambulong, Libjo, San Isidro, and Malitam. These initiatives make use of studies that identify the particular needs of the respective beneficiaries.

To promote accessible and affordable healthcare, the Takeda Patient Assistance Program (TPAP) covers the costs of patients' full course of treatment for certain medications. They are also provided with personalized treatment plans that allow them to optimize their treatment benefits.

Beyond our health programs that address diseases that greatly impact populations, PSFI also continued the conduct of its Road Safety program, BiyaHERO or Be-a-Hero that develops community volunteers into becoming Road Safety Mentors. These mentors promote and practice road safety for pedestrians, commuters, and drivers, aiming to increase awareness and reduce accidents in their respective communities.

LEARNINGS

Immediate responses are key to providing timely health-related assistance. To ensure that our programs were being carried out in a timely manner, frequent alignments and digitalization proved to be useful in streamlining our systems.

For future improvements to our processes, we aim to conduct more consultations with beneficiaries to get more accurate data on their needed treatments. Proper monitoring helps us evaluate the impacts of our programs and better implement them in the future.

PROMOTING ROAD SAFETY: BIYAHERO (BE-A-HERO) CAMPAIGN

As part of the Tagbilaran Sustainable Development Program (TSDP), PSFI collaborated with the Tagbilaran City Traffic Management Office and Automobile Association Philippines to conduct a road safety campaign, also called the BiyaHERO program. A road safety program was also initiated in Cagayan de Oro, where IEC materials were used to communicate general safety protocol and best practices.

The programs pull together efforts from both government and non-government stakeholders, showcasing the importance of inter-sectoral collaboration for the benefit of public safety. The aim of the initiative is ultimately to lessen the number of road-related incidents and violations that happen due to lack of awareness and enforcement.

CHANGE UNDERWAY: HIV PROTECTS - YEAR 1

In 2021, PSFI kickstarted the first year of the HIV PROTECTS Program with several awareness campaigns to further the advocacy. Within the year, PSFI launched the #UMatter awareness campaign, which supports the program's commitment to ending HIV and AIDS. The audience of the campaign includes the general public as well as key decision-makers in the country, to help forward better interventions addressing HIV.

Another activity for the first year of HIV PROTECTS is the Philippine International AIDS Candlelight Memorial (PIACM), where PSFI served as a partner for the event hosted by the Project Red Ribbon. The commemorative event recognizes those who passed away because of HIV and AIDS and acknowledges individuals and groups who are committed to the cause.



Lilibeth Mansuri was an active Malaria health volunteer in Brgy. Malis, Palawan. She acquired a scholarship and graduated with a BS in Midwifery degree at Mary's Chiles College. Lilibeth continued to serve her barangay as a midwife, and was among those who administered COVID-19 vaccinations in her community.

In the fight against deadly diseases, PSFI recognizes the individuals and organizations that have come together to bring communities back up to better health.

In the MAM, Lilibeth Mansuri is a rapid diagnostic test- (RDT) trained barangay health worker who has been a consistent volunteer for house-to-house visitations for testing. Now a midwife, she goes beyond her call of duty by also administering COVID-19 vaccinations in her barangay. She qualified for a scholarship program under the Department of Health in 2017 for a Bachelor of Science in Midwifery at Mary's Chiles College.

The RAJAH Community Center in Iloilo is an

accredited HIV Primary Care Center that has been recognized for its capacity to provide treatment services and technical support, and is a recipient of several awards for its role in furthering HIV awareness on the local level. Supported by the 2018 Global Fund, it is now also funded by the PSFI PROTECTS Grant to ensure that it may continue to deliver quality healthcare services needed by the country. The community center stands as a Good Practice Model at the regional level for its one-stop-shop services on HIV and AIDS care and support. It continues to further its advocacies by serving as a safe space for key affected populations and promoting access to HIV treatment, care, and support.

ENVIRONMENT

Climate change is a global concern. At the heart of this concern is the Philippines, the most vulnerable country to the climate crisis, according to the Institute for Economics and Peace in 2019. The changes in the country's climate patterns result in extreme weather conditions that cause longer and more severe droughts, threats to biodiversity and food security, public health risks, and endangerment of women and indigenous peoples.

Motivated by our commitment to building communities resilient to the changes and impacts caused by climate change, PSFI implements the LiveWIRE Ecobrick Project – a program aimed to protect the environment from further pollution and support the Cagayan de Oro's waste management directive. In partnership with the Macajalar Wharf Porter's Association, it collects and repurposes plastic waste from communities to create alternative construction materials, focusing on alleviating environmental concerns and providing livelihood opportunities for the members of the community. The EcoBrick Hub in Brgy. Macabalan is central to this program. PSFI demonstrated the capabilities of the EcoBrick Hub in the Oro BEST Expo 2.0, promoting sustainability through using Ecobricks as a durable and eco-friendly alternative construction material that reduces plastic waste.

Through our reintroduced Tagbilaran Sustainable Development Program (TSPD), we are able to develop a more strategic and long-term approach to building a resilient community by expanding

initiatives on livelihood, environment, and health and safety in Tagbilaran City, Bohol. PSFI worked closely with relevant stakeholders such as Shell companies in the Philippines, the local government unit, and barangay local government units in furthering our causes in the City. We planted 1,000 mangroves in Brgy. Taloto, Tagbilaran City, donated 15 material recovery facilities to each barangay, and conducted a bio-composting training. Through TSDP, we build a more sustainable environment for future generations by promoting and performing best conservation practices in our worksites and neighboring communities.

We believe that the best solutions are holistic and interconnected, creating a local economy that creates value throughout. Under the Ridge to Reef Program, PSFI adopted a 3.2 hectare coastal area in Brgy Bonbon to outplant 8,000 mangroves and supported the Northern Mindanao District of the Philippine Coast Guard by participating in their coastal clean-up and mangrove planting activity.

Turismo At Negosyo Dulot ng Ingat KAlikasaN (TANDIKAN) program also exemplifies this systems thinking approach in creating solutions and improving the local community's quality of life. TANDIKAN has been addressing the problems and challenges of environmental degradation and inadequate employment and livelihood opportunities in Palawan since 2015. The program primarily aims to support Community-Based Sustainable Tourism (CBST) sites in Palawan by closely working with the local governments and communities. We continue to mentor and empower ten community-based sustainable tourism sites in Puerto Princesa and in the Municipality of El Nido.

In particular, PSFI has been working closely with the Puerto Princesa Subterranean River National Park (PPSRNP) to develop the Puerto Princesa Underground River (PPUR) while conserving the site as a UNESCO World Heritage Site. This involves Communication, Education, and Public Awareness (CEPA) initiatives and capacity-building activities, ensuring that current and future generations have a balanced relationship with the environment.

TANDIKAN has supported various community tree planting activities such as Love Affair with Nature or Pista y ng Cagueban (or Feast of the Forest) which are led by the community or the local government units. A total of over 3,700 assorted trees either mangrove or fruit trees were

planted. We remain steadfast in our commitment to building climate change-resilient communities as it is crucial in achieving inclusive growth.

The Carbon Sink Program also serves as one of PSFI's immediate actions on climate change while promoting sustainable livelihood and environmental awareness. The program contributes to climate change mitigation through forestation efforts. PSFI also provided local farmers with livelihood training, enabling them to collaborate and register with DOLE as a farmers' organization. We strive to create comprehensive environmental programs that also positively impact communities socially and economically.

LEARNINGS

Despite the challenges posed by COVID-19 and its restrictions, communication is still one of the most pivotal factors in actualizing our vision. Constant communication with our partners and stakeholders, whether through personal or virtual conferences, emails, or social media, must be maintained to ensure that we are all on the same page. This also contributes to our ability to properly plan and prepare for our programs, especially in cases of natural disasters and other crises.

As our partner and stakeholder, the local government unit and its relevant agencies play a significant role in materializing our projects. It is crucial to maintain effective collaboration and positive relationships with them, considering that they are the people who have adequate knowledge of the area and their constituents' needs.

REBUILDING COMMUNITIES: THE SHELL-LIVEWIRE ECOBRICK HUB

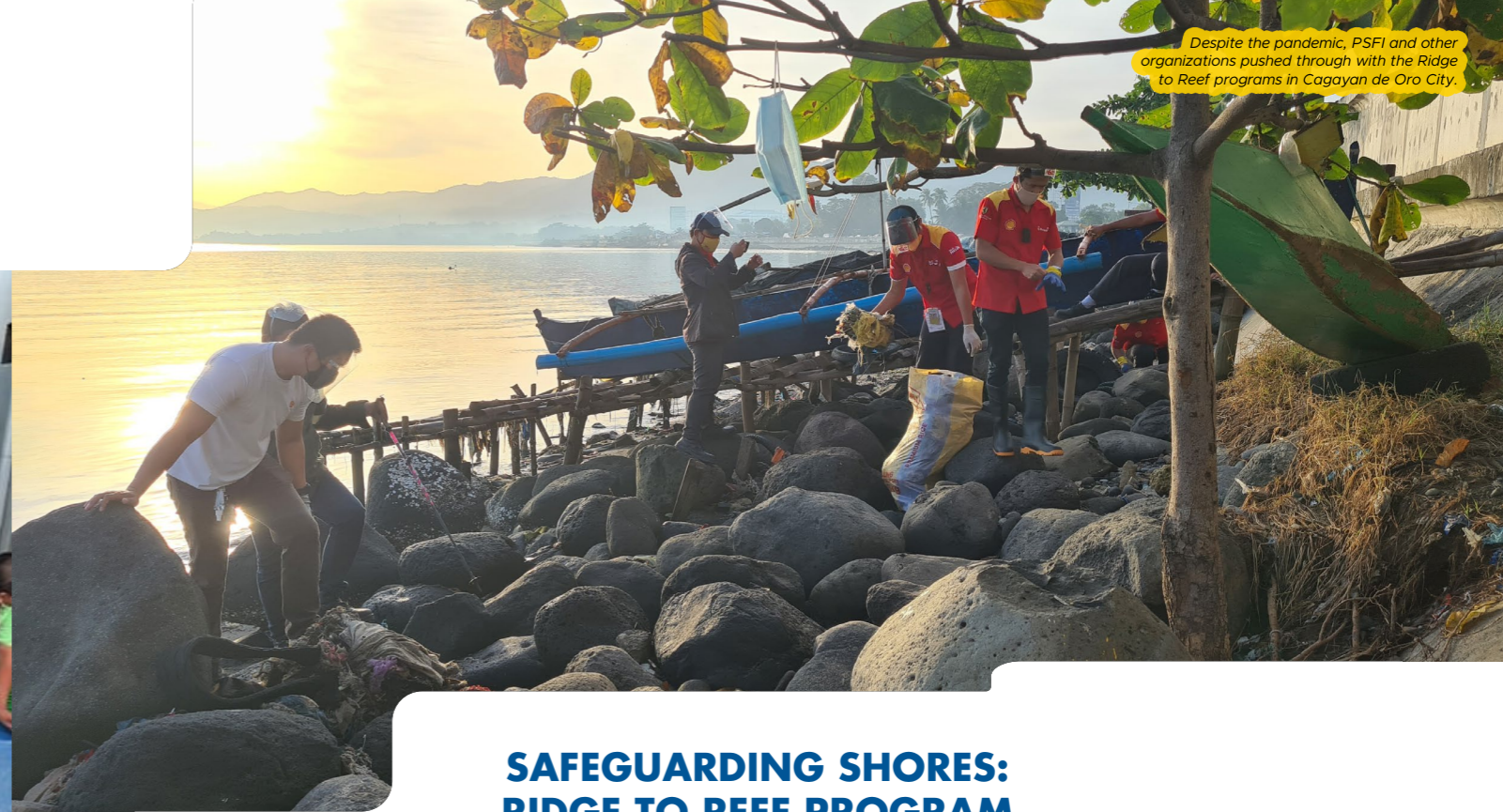
When Typhoon Yolanda, one of the most powerful tropical cyclones ever recorded, hit the Philippines in 2013, its destruction was so devastating that the rehabilitation process for some is still ongoing until now. Because of the damages brought about by the typhoon, the City declared the coastal areas as high risk and unfit for housing.

PSFI implemented the Anibong and Yolanda Recovery and Rehabilitation Program (ARRP), a social development program that focuses on disaster relief and community resiliency. Supporting Tacloban City's local government in carrying out the last phase of the Yolanda Recovery Interventions, PSFI constructed 13 houses in North Kawayan Ville for the most vulnerable households. The 13

housing units and EcoBrick hub were built to utilize sustainable materials that can also help in reducing solid waste.

As part of the program, PSFI trained locals to help prepare for the establishment of a beach forest for disaster risk reduction. We also conducted livelihood interventions through LiveWIRE, wherein 75 residents underwent entrepreneurial training.

Acknowledging that environmental problems stretch across different aspects of people's lives, we also aspire to empower the community in terms of livelihood, education, disaster risk response, nutrition, and health while uplifting the community's environment.

SAFEGUARDING SHORES: RIDGE TO REEF PROGRAM

The Philippines is undeniably a biodiversity-rich country. It is blessed with various species of animals and plants that thrive in the country's environment. However, our biodiversity is under threat due to activities that pollute our bodies of water. Solid waste in our seas endangers wildlife and humans, even more so with tropical cyclones.

The Philippines is among the most vulnerable countries to climate change impacts, especially tropical cyclones, flooding, and landslides. The number of tropical cyclones making landfall in the Philippines progressively increases with greater intensity, resulting in higher water levels.

With environmental stewardship being one of PSFI's advocacies, we try our best to embody sustainable practices that will help keep our seas and mankind safe.

Under the Ridge to Reef Program, PSFI commenced the year by adopting the 3.2 hectares of coastal area in Brgy. Bonbon. This was a donation of plastic drums for water storage, PSFI providing support to the Philippine Coast Guard-Northern Mindanao District on February 6 along the stretch of the Lapasan Coastal Road. PSFI volunteers participated in the International Coastal Cleanup Day, a simultaneous global cleanup held every third Saturday of September.

We removed trash and debris along the coasts of Brgys. Sinaloc, El Salvador, Misamis Oriental. Aside from the cleanup, the volunteers also planted 650 mangrove seedlings on the same day.

We also organized the Community-Based Mangrove Rehabilitation project to plant and grow 8,000 mangrove seedlings on 3.2 hectares in 2021. Over 2,000 miyapi seedlings are already planted in Brgy. Bonbon; the rest are yet to follow after the delay caused by the pandemic restrictions and tropical storms. Nonetheless, the initially planted seedlings are regularly monitored by project partners, Xavier University-McKeough Marine Center and Sari-sari Fishermen's Association.

Mangroves are a natural coastal defense that forms a barrier against storm surges and floods. They also protect the coastlines and slow erosion, making them ideal coastline barriers. Moreover, mangroves also develop habitats for other wildlife and may provide a livelihood for residents of the community.

PSFI continues to devote itself to cleaning our shorelines and keeping them healthy as a manifestation of our commitment to environmental stewardship, helping mitigate the impacts of climate change.

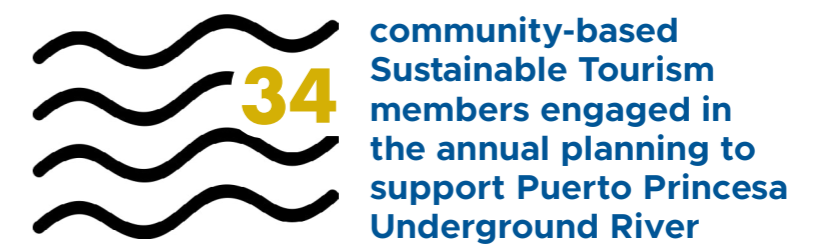
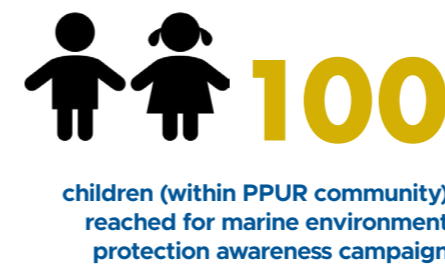
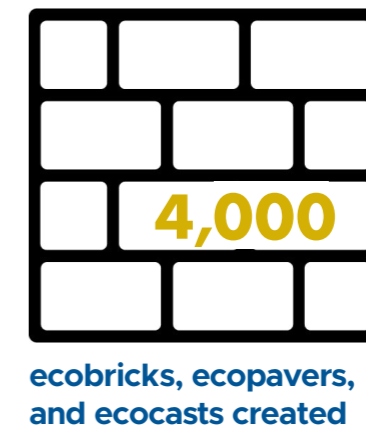
PSFI recognizes the significance of the context-based approach to its development and biodiversity program and emphasizes community-based sustainable tourism for tourist areas. It empowers locals through training programs on proper and sustainable means of protecting and conserving the environment.

Ms. Maria Evelyn Maguilan Pable is a beneficiary and the Information Officer of Dewil Eco-Mangrove Association, a community-based sustainable tourism initiative in El Nido supported by PSFI through the TANDIKAN program. She appreciated the activities that highlighted caring for the mangrove ecosystem.

Ms. Pable's livelihood is dependent on the TANDIKAN program, which motivates her to hone her skills in managing community-based sustainable tourism.

Amid the pandemic, their association still gathers to clean and manage the center. They conduct tree-planting and cleanup activities to signify their love and gratitude to the mangrove ecosystem that helps their community combat the impacts of climate change and provides livelihood opportunities as well.

ENVIRONMENT AT A GLANCE



ENERGY

The Casoyan Hybrid Microgrid Power System is among the many initiatives of the SINAG or A2E project, which provides sustainable energy supply to remote communities.



OVERVIEW

PSFI harnesses the enabling power of energy to empower Filipinos. We bridge individuals and families with better livelihood, educational, and health-related opportunities – helping them progress. We established this thematic area in line with SDG 7: Affordable and Clean Energy.

THE PROGRAM

- Save, Invest, Nurture Access to Green Energy and Technologies (SINAG)

PROJECT SINAG

The World Bank Global Electrification Database shows that in 2019, approximately 95.6% of Filipinos have access to electricity. However, a study by the Asian Development Bank Institute (ADB) shows that while supplying electricity to the cities, rural areas are being left behind. Despite the improvement of access to electricity in the country, the growing demand for electricity still remains. The Philippines is still suffering from energy insecurity and supply remains to be relatively scarce. There is an exponentially growing demand for electricity, although the supply is relatively scarce. Power outages are fairly frequent and the electricity rate is comparatively high.

Through Save, Invest, Nurture Access to Green Energy and Technologies (SINAG) or the Access to Energy (A2E) project, PSFI provides affordable, cleaner, and more efficient energy in far-flung areas. In 2014, we started supplying sustainable and community-based microgrid access to power for off-grid sites in Palawan by maximizing the use of available renewable energy sources in the area, such as solar, wind, and hydro. In partnership with the local government unit of San Vicente, Palawan, PSFI inaugurated the Casoyan Hybrid Microgrid Power System that benefitted 140 households.

PSFI also empowers the beneficiaries of SINAG A2E by training them to maintain and operate the facilities independently. The project has made significant impacts on the local communities and environment, and was recognized by the CSR Guild Awards in 2021 as an Outstanding CSR Project for the Environment category. The CSR Guild Awards has documented ten generator sets decommissioned and 283 kerosene lamps put off in 2020 alone. Through SINAG, at least 5,628 kg of CO2 emissions were reduced from these decommissioned generator sets. Since its launch in 2014, SINAG has eliminated the use of around 800 kerosene lamps and has had 35 diesel generators decommissioned – resulting in cleaner and fresher air in the seven communities we've worked with.

PSFI aims to provide reliable and clean energy to more areas in need. Through our continuing efforts, we hope to empower communities and individuals to reach their full potential.



LEARNINGS

Bayanihan is one of the prevailing Filipino values that influence community building and development. As much as our dedication is unwavering, it is equally essential for the residents to be directly involved in the sustainability programs. The COVID-19 restrictions may have affected the realization of Project SINAG, but it is the sense of community and ownership by the residents that made the project implementation successful.

ENERGY PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

A BRIGHTER BATANGAS: INSTALLATION OF STREETLIGHTS

Most road accidents at night are due to low visibility from the poor design or the absence of streetlights. Residents rely on improved visibility and safety afforded by excellent lighting conditions on well-lit roads. However, not all streets in the country are properly lit, increasing the chance of road accidents.

Acknowledging the need for well-lit roads, PSFI and Pilipinas Shell Petroleum Corporation (PSPC) donated solar-power streetlights, road signages, and equipment to Brgy. Ambulong, Batangas City, on November 24.

An innovative project of PSFI, SINAG aims to provide affordable and more efficient energy to far-flung communities. Under SINAG, a total of 48 solar lamps were installed within the 4 kilometer stretch of the Batangas-Lobo National Highway. A total of 31 community volunteers participated in the maintenance team of the solar-powered streetlights.

As an essential public service, the installation of streetlights paves the way to a safer environment. It fortifies the existing safety measures of the local government in maintaining road-user-friendly streets.

ENERGIZING AMID A CRISIS: SOLAR LAMP DISTRIBUTION FOR TYPHOON ODETTA RELIEF

Energy is a basic necessity that PSFI continues to deliver primarily in times of dire need. When Typhoon Odette ravaged the Philippines last December, many areas experienced power outages that lasted several days. Embodying

our commitment, PSFI distributed solar lamps to families impacted by Typhoon Odette in Cagayan de Oro, Cebu, Bohol, Tacloban, Southern Leyte (Liloan), Palawan, Cabadbaran, Surigao, Siargao and Dinagat Island.



OUR IMPACT

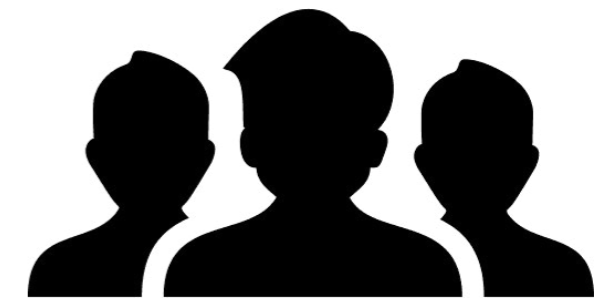
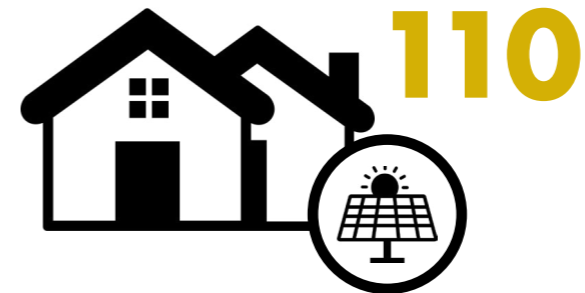
Many Filipinos are still deprived of household energy because it is undeniably expensive. For years, PSFI has committed to providing alternative ways for far-flung communities to experience the power that most cities are given priority.

Through renewable energy developed by SINAG Hybrid Microgrid Project in Albaguen, San Vicente, Palawan, nearby areas are experiencing electricity that allows them to improve their living conditions.

Marilou Pintuan, a housewife, used to spend most of her time doing housework manually. When her community became a recipient of SINAG's project, Marilou was able to use a washing machine that saves most of her time doing laundry. She now has more time to help her husband earn a living by selling ice, contributing to the overall income of their family for their daily needs.

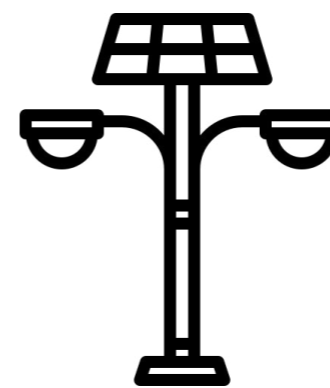

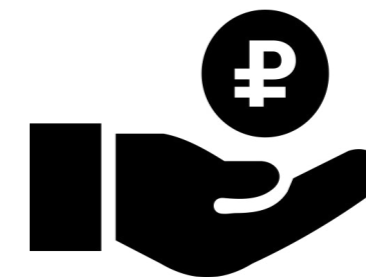

NUTRITION AND FOOD SECURITY



PSFI established the Palawan Eco Agro Park (PEAP) to contribute to food security and improved quality of life of communities in El Nido.

OVERVIEW

PSFI works to improve food and nutrition security in the Philippines. We recognize that nutrition and food security plays a fundamental role in a child's development and the nation's economic growth. We established this thematic area in line with SDG 2: Zero Hunger.

NUTRITION AND FOOD SECURITY AMID THE PANDEMIC



PSFI promotes Integrated Farming Bio-System (IFBS) in its Shell Training Farms (STF), ensuring that benefits from farming are maximized and are sustainable.

The Philippine food inflation rate reached 6.2% in March 2021. According to the Social Weather Stations, one in five Filipinos did not have enough food on their table in 2020, which is double the record before the pandemic. About 22 million Filipinos suffer from food insecurity and are not able to produce sustainable meals, therefore resulting to chronic undernutrition. With the periodic lockdowns imposed due to COVID-19 and the typhoons that flooded areas of the country, farmers are left with washed-out farms and skyrocketing food prices.

To alleviate the current nutrition and food insecurity exacerbated by the pandemic, PSFI strengthened its Shell Training Farms (STF) by intensifying its technology adoption through the various demonstration modules and maximizing agricultural skill extension programs. This allows farmers to cultivate competitive and environmentally sound practices for sustainable farming that enhances the country's food security. As part of STF's Rice Competitiveness Enhancement Fund Program, a program under the Technical Education and Skills Development Authority, 225 farmers trained in producing high-quality inbred rice, seed certification, and farm mechanization. The training activity was held in San Antonio, Bombon, Camarines Sur at the Shell Training Farm.

Inspired by the community pantries that mushroomed throughout the country in early 2021, PSFI launched "Tabang sa Balangay" in partnership with the Naval Forces West (NFW) Civil Military Operations Unit (CMOU), Brgy. Irawan LGU, and ACE Extreme. The program aimed to encourage and uplift the poor and marginalized sectors heavily affected by the pandemic. The community pantry initiative delivered food packs, fruits, and vegetables to 160 Indigenous People (IP) families in Brgy. Irawan, Puerto Princesa City. The 240 kilos of assorted fresh produce were provided by farmer communities from Brgys. Cabayugan and Tagabinet, who were displaced tourism frontliners who found alternative livelihood in farming through PSFI's programs.

Integrated Farming Bio-Systems (IFBS), a capacity-building program, was also conducted to train farmers on appropriate farming technologies. These promote sustainable crop production and animal agroforestry, converting farm wastes into bio-organic fertilizers with bio-organic fertilizers microbial inoculants, and farm entrepreneurship.

A total of 391 graduates were trained on IFBS through the Omasenso sa Kabuhayan program under the flagship Angat-Buhay program of the Office of the Vice President of the Philippines. We also conducted upskilling training and donated various equipment and materials to 16 farmer groups.

As a multi-stakeholder, multi-sectoral initiative that focuses on nurturing children in the earliest stages of their development, the Roots to Shoots program aims to improve the nutritional and food security status in pilot municipalities within Camarines Sur through integrated nutrition. The Roots to Shoots initiative draws three elements of health and nutrition: food security and livelihood (FSL), water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH), and education and gender empowerment in a community-based approach. Among the milestones reached by this initiative under the FSL component are the 450 home gardens established with a consolidated harvest of more than 6,000 kilograms, seven community gardens established with a consolidated yield of around 650 kilograms, and three school gardens supported. The WASH component also achieved the construction of 17 hand hygiene stations, the rehabilitation of Bombon Water District, and the

construction of 42 individual toilets facilities at Bombon and Pasacao, among others.

The Palawan Eco-Agro Park (PEAP) was established in 2019 as a sustainable training, demonstration, and information center of agricultural and entrepreneurial opportunities for the growing economy and fragile environment of Palawan. It aims to assure nutrition and food security in El Nido and nearby municipalities through farm operations. To supplement the farm's objectives, the El Nido Food Terminal Project was launched in 2021.

LEARNINGS

Some things were out of our control, especially with the changing COVID-19 health protocols, such as the hesitancy of the residents to attend the activities for safety reasons. We found that conducting health, safety, security, and environment orientation before each training proper assures the participants of the PSFI's commitment to putting their safety above everything.

Proper coordination with the local government unit and open and transparent communication with program partners and stakeholders allow a smoother project implementation. Reminding the participants of the project's essence and benefits encourages them to participate actively.

NUTRITION AND FOOD SECURITY PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

EMPOWERING LOCAL ECONOMIES: PALAWAN ECO AGRO PARK

TRANSFORMING SYSTEM: SHELL TRAINING FARMS - FARMERS DIGITAL INCLUSION PROJECT

More than 22% of the country's population is in the agricultural industry, which was severely affected when COVID-19 hit the country. The pandemic, coupled with several typhoons that devastated farming areas, undeniably affected the living conditions of many of the country's farmers and stunted their farm's chance for growth.

A report released by the World Bank entitled "Transforming Philippine Agriculture During COVID-19 and Beyond" emphasizes the significance of a vibrant and modernized agricultural sector for faster recovery and poverty reduction. According to the report, a modernized agriculture industry ensures solid and strategic alliances between farms and other supply chain partners, a more affordable and nutritious food, and a more vibrant rural economy.

Understanding the importance of a gradual transition towards the envisioned modernized agricultural sector, PSFI organized the Farmers Digital Inclusion project to introduce the

modernized world to the farmers through a mobile application, OkCheck. OkCheck provides information specifically on agriculture and knowledge from any learning modules on the Internet, allowing farmers to improve their productivity and enhance their product quality and quantity.

Our beneficiaries can also effectively resolve onsite concerns and utilize downloadable Shell Training Farms learning modules through the provided mobile phones. This also allows a more accessible collection of data from farmer-beneficiaries remotely, which reduces frequent field visitations.

A total of 100 farmer-beneficiaries from PSFI implementing programs: Angat-Buhay Program, Roots to Shoots – Food Security and Livelihood, Rice Competitiveness Enhancement Fund Program, and other PSFI programs in Camarines Sur and Pililla, Rizal were accommodated by the Farmers Digital Inclusion Project.

With the hopes to increase farm productivity and food sustainability, PSFI established the Palawan Eco Agro Park (PEAP) for the growing economy and fragile environment of Palawan. PEAP was inaugurated last 2019 at Sitio Calampinay, Brgy. Pasadena, El Nido, Palawan.

In partnership with the Provincial Government of Palawan and the Municipality of El Nido, we continue to empower and provide farmers with the knowledge and skills on appropriate technologies and entrepreneurship to ensure that crops are sustainable and able to withstand weather disturbances such as heavy rains and typhoons.

Among the efforts of PEAP is organic vegetable production, with products such as tomato, hot pepper, okra, string beans, and leafy vegetables.

High-value vegetables such as broccoli, cauliflower, and cabbage, were also planted. In the same year of its inauguration, PEAP produced 3,274.19 kilograms with a total sales of Php 177,786.50.

Through the partnership of PSFI with the Ayala Foundation Inc., Asosasyon ng mga Magsasaka at Mangingisda sa Munisipyo ng El Nido Inc. (AMMMENI), and the Municipality, the El Nido Food Terminal Project was materialized. As a trading center, the Terminal links farm producers in El Nido to make goods that are accessible and affordable for nearby communities and markets. The Terminal is expected to help lower the prices of agricultural products and empower AMMMENI farmer-members to sustain their farm operations and improve their income.

OUR IMPACT

Empowering our farmers by providing more opportunities for sustainable agricultural practices is a step closer to alleviating the country's nutrition and food insecurity issue.

Marvin Joven, a 28-year-old resident of Brgy. Tinanquihan, Libmanan, Camarines Sur, expanded his farming area and engaged in multi-crop and seedling production after attending the Integrated Farming Bio-Systems Training conducted at Shell Training Farm Bombon. He accepted the training challenge and personally adopted the appropriate cultural practices on crops, primarily on vegetable production, organic livestock production technologies, crop protection, and principles through farm planning, as discussed.

The vegetable production section of his area is now in its transition period from conventional to organic farming. He is aiming to actualize a 50% organic approach this year. But he did not stop

there. He shared his new learnings on the benefits of intercropping to maximize the use of the area and the utilization of foliar and organic fertilizer to produce safe and nutritious vegetables to his fellow farmers in their community.

Marvin is already beginning to engage in food processing, such as Ginger Brew and Tea which has helped him increase his income. Indeed, a theory is much more beneficial when practiced.

By uplifting and capacitating our marginal farmers through our programs, PSFI is able to contribute to changing their lives for the better.

Jesus Meriado is a rice and vegetable farmer who has adjusted his crops based on the country's season. During the wet season, he plants rice, while in the dry season, he plants melons. Because the rice field is not his, he pays rent after every harvest. He was used to a simple

life and contented with sending all of his children to school.

When he entered PSFI's Ani Para sa Bayani 2020, he was confident that he could supply us with good quality white rice. His ability to deliver quality produce enabled PSFI to distribute the much-needed goods to communities in NCR that were affected by the pandemic. Seeing that our program was profitable, he gathered all the rice stock from his farmer's association and supplied it to us. The price we gave to him was relatively higher than the market price.

From selling rice without any transportation, he now owns a van. He uses it as a service vehicle for his family – a timely step now that they are able to go to places and bring their produce to markets in Metro Manila amid the pandemic. Hitting two birds with one stone, our program procured white rice from local farmers

and distributed the produce to vulnerable communities, helping the local farmers and those who need their produce.

PSFI continues to extend its support to some of the most vulnerable sectors in the country—women and children.

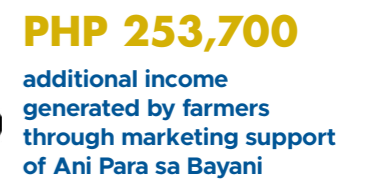
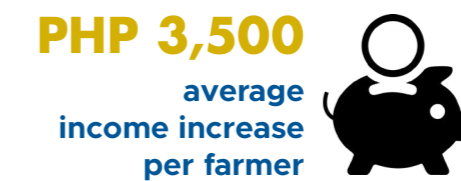
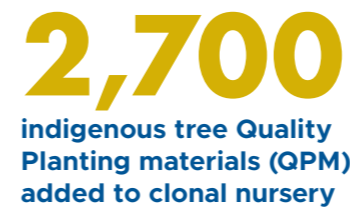
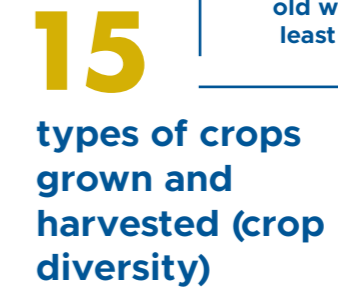
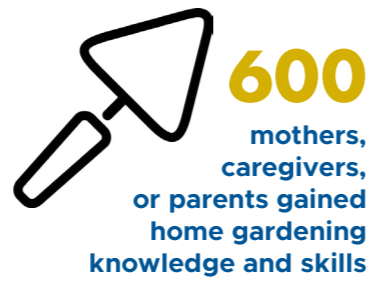
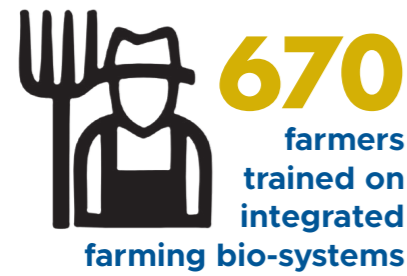
For PSFI's Roots to Shoots (RTS) initiative, mothers or caregivers and malnourished children aged 0-2 years old from Sitio Bunga, Dalupaon, Pasacao were the beneficiaries. RTS is a multi-stakeholder, multi-sectoral initiative aimed at nurturing and transforming human potential. This program focuses on the earliest stages of child development and aims to foster the right conditions for children to grow and reach their full potential. The program takes a holistic and community-based approach to providing solutions, as it brings together elements of health and nutrition, food security and livelihood (FSL), water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH), education, and gender empowerment.

Camarines Sur was the priority area for RTS since it is one of the provinces most affected by malnutrition. In a study by the Philippine Statistics Authority (PSA), Camarines Sur has the highest magnitude of affected children. In 2015, there were 75,830 stunted and 33,897 underweight children. The Province also ranked 3rd in undernutrition and stunting at 28.12% and 12.57% across the country. RTS aimed to alleviate this through supplemental feeding for children and implemented nutrition sessions to ensure that this was achieved.

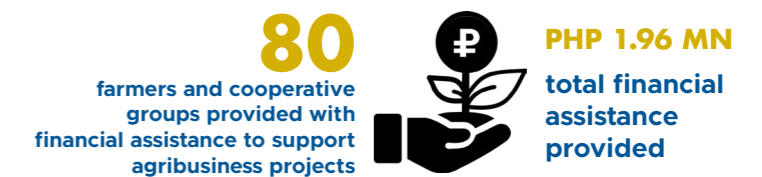
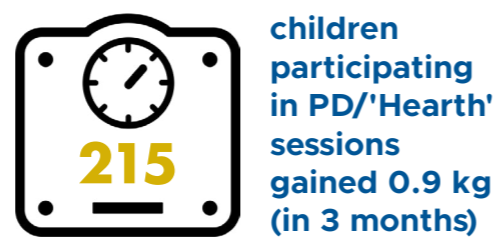
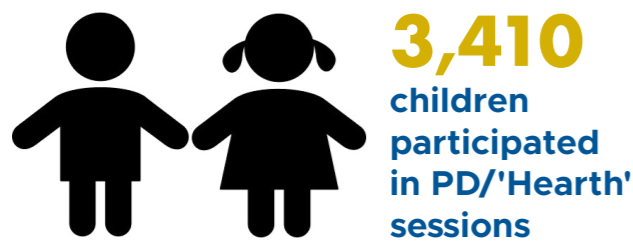
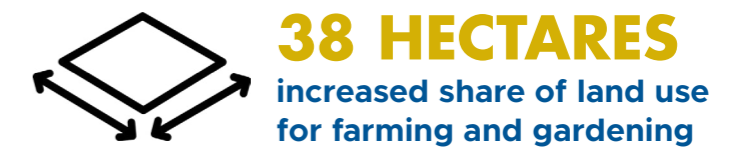
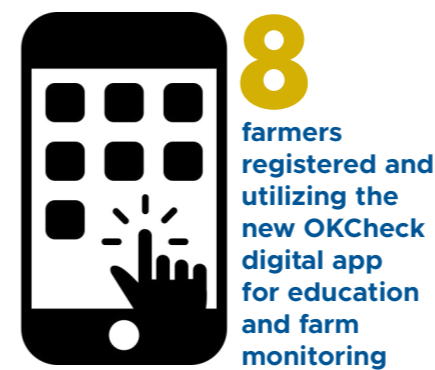
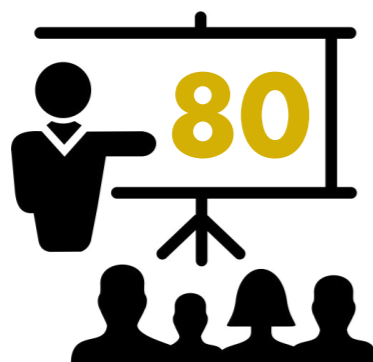
Aside from that, PSFI also organized a 1.5-day training on home gardening and organic vegetable production for better food access and sustainable food production. Assorted vegetable seeds and handouts were also given as part of the training kit.

Enlightened by the new prospects ahead, the beneficiaries decided to form a group and establish a community garden in Dalupaon, Pasacao. Because of the beneficiaries' initiative, PSFI provided additional support such as vegetable seeds, garden tools, nursery materials, and organic fertilizer. With enough inspiration and assistance, people are able to pave their own way to empower themselves and their communities.
